

# TOXICOLOGIE ANALYTIQUE ET CLINIQUE

## Guide for authors

*Toxicologie Analytique et Clinique* is an international peer-reviewed journal essentially devoted to analytical & clinical toxicology, covering all of the following aspects: clinical, forensic, environmental, occupational medicine, doping, addiction, alternative matrices, and quality assurance. Regulatory and legislative aspects are also being considered for inclusion.

*Toxicologie Analytique et Clinique* publishes the following material in French and in English:

- Original articles,
- Review articles, which might be suggested by the editorial board,
- Short articles, reserved for innovative results whose scientific interest justifies fast publication,
- Laboratory notes,
- Letters to the editor and letters concerning articles published in the journal,
- Editorials on topics of current interest,
- Reviews of scientific books,
- Conference reports and proceedings, particularly those of the [Société Française de Toxicologie Analytique](#) and the [Société de Toxicologie Clinique](#).

The journal also publishes thematic issues on topical subject.

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### *Brief overview of the EES system*

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**For French article:** title, abstract and key words in English are required.

### **Title page**

- Title: short and informative.
- An English translation of the title for French article.
- Names of authors: first name in full, followed by last name.
- Complete affiliations of each author (zip code, city and country).
- The contact author (correspondence purpose) must be indicated by an asterisk, and his/her full professional address and e-mail address must be given at the bottom of the page. Please note e-mail address will appear on the publication.

### **Abstract and key words**

- The abstract should not be longer than 250 words. They must be structured. Only standard, common abbreviations are allowed.
- 3 to 6 key words chosen from the Medical Subject Headings of the Medicus Index (<http://www.nlm.nih.gov/>).
- Letters to the editor have no abstract, but a title and key words.

### **Text**

- The main body of the manuscript must be clear and concise. Authors shall ensure correct spelling, syntax and punctuation.
- The text must be laid out in classic style, with numbered sections carrying the following headings: introduction, equipment (or patients) and methods, results, discussion, conclusion, acknowledgements, possible competing interest. The heading can be modified depending on the type of article; however, the paragraphs should be numbered.

### **Abbreviations, units and symbols**

- The general rules concerning the nomenclature of abbreviations and symbols are those approved by the IUPAC (International Union of Pure and Applied Chemistry).
- Every abbreviation must be explained the first time it appears in the text.
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nanogramme/milligramme, ng/mg (for hair).

- For drugs, the recognised INN must always be used. The name of the associated specialities shall be mentioned the first time only, followed by the symbol <sup>TM</sup> or ®.

### Acknowledgements

Collate acknowledgements in a separate section at the end of the article before the references. List here those individuals who provided help during the research (e.g., providing language help, writing assistance or proof reading the article, etc.).

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You are requested to identify, at the end of the manuscript, who provided financial support for the conduct of the research and/or preparation of the article and to briefly describe the role of the sponsor(s), if any, in study design; in the collection, analysis and interpretation of data; in the writing of the report; and in the decision to submit the article for publication. If the funding source(s) had no such involvement, then this should be stated.

### References

- References are numbered according to their order of appearance in the text. They are identified in the text, tables and captions by Arabic numerals in brackets, and separated by hyphens for a range of consecutive references, e.g. (1-4) and by commas without spaces for non-consecutive references, e.g. (3,8,21).
- All references listed must be cited in the text (included those cited in figures and tables).
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- Up to 6 authors' name are listed; beyond this indicate the first 6 followed by "et al."

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- Each table must be presented on a separate sheet, without vertical ruling lines. It must be accompanied by a title (placed above it) and all necessary notes (placed below it) to make it comprehensible without reference to the text. In particular, the meaning of all abbreviations and symbols must be specified.

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
